When you sponsor a child with Mission To Haiti, you provide your child with the opportunity to receive medical care. Sponsorship is \$35 per month. It provides, education, nutrition, and health care. There are children waiting to be sponsored at *missiontohaiti.org*

Recently, we began working with a local Haitian doctor to see sponsored children who are sick. We have asked Dr. Lens Francois to be available at the clinic one day a week. Dr. Francois (*above*) has his own medical practice and is licensed by the government of Haiti.

This will give our sponsored children an opportunity to make an appointment to see Dr. Francois. If necessary, he will run lab tests and provide prescription drugs to treat medical problems. Infections, malaria, and other diseases are common among Haitian children. King's Hospital continues to see children who have medical emergencies or who need surgery.


Our clinic supervisor Suzanne Labady and our nurse Claudette Chantrel are seeing children during the week in the wellness checks at the schools.
