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Our Founders' Challenge 2022

Earlier this month, technicians installed two new solar systems in the two caretakers' houses on the mission campus. Buying gasoline to run small generators has become more difficult and more expensive. Insecurity in downtown Port au Prince has affected the distribution and the price of fuel. When the U.S. staff is not in Haiti, our Haitian Partners need a consistent way to operate from the mission campus. For now solar is the best way.

Under the current conditions in Haiti, the mission campus has become a busy place. The Cazeau community where the mission campus is located is safe and easy to reach by local transportation. That makes it easy for sponsored children and their families to come when updates

are needed. It makes the mission campus the best place for the sponsorship staff to meet with the pastors and principals. And the campus clinic is the best place to care for the sponsored children who need help.

Last year, we installed solar systems in the clinic and sponsorship offices. This has allowed our Haitian staff to keep moving forward and get their work done.

Founders' Challenge offerings provide funds for the mission campus to be the center of operations for Mission To Haiti. **Operational expenses in Haiti this year will be \$100,000.** Your offerings for these operational expenses will allow the work in Haiti to continue to grow. Vocational Students Preparing To Graduate

The Vocational School at Beudet is preparing to graduate sixteen students. These students are almost finished with their three-year sewing program. But before they can graduate, they will need to create three outfits. This will prove that they have successfully learned the skills they should know to be full fledged seamstresses and tailors.

The verse that comes to mind is 2 Timothy 2:15, *"Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."*

Pastor Cadet who heads this program said these students are saved and serving the Lord. When they graduate and begin working on their own, they will be witnesses for the Gospel. They will be able to reach many with the Good News through their sewing.

There are ways that you can help these graduating students.

Pastor Cadet needs **\$800 for materials and supplies** for the 16 students to make their final projects. He also needs **\$600 to hold the graduation.**

A great graduating gift for each student would be their own **treddle sewing machine. Each one costs \$200.** This would allow the students to begin working on their own immediately upon graduating. Your offering is a life-long investment in the lives of these young people. Thank you!
