

Where Mission To Haiti Came From



In the summer of 1960 Bill Sr. was invited to make a weekend trip to Haiti. Missionaries who were returning to the United States invited Bill to consider serving there. A couple of years earlier, Bill made a tenday mission trip to Cuba. He went with a group from his Bible

college at Easter. His heart was moved by the trip and he considered returning after he graduated. But by then Castro's communist revolution closed the door to missionaries. It was a turbulent time in the world. But God used these difficult times to prepare Bill.

It was not until 1976 that Bill Sr. returned to Haiti. By then he, Ann and their young family were serving in Hialeah near Miami. Thousands of Cubans had already begun to immigrate to S. Florida since the 1960s. Now Haitians were starting to come to escape poverty and persecution under the Duvalier regime. The Miami area became a hotbed of activity as cultures from around the region began to clash. The new influx of Haitians put a spotlight on Haiti and its smoldering issues. It also brought to light the great needs and opportunities that exist in Haiti. Despite the international attention they received, Haiti was still a very isolated place. There were many parts of Haiti that were untouched, especially to the Gospel. With this in mind, Bill embarked on a week-long trip to see the situation for himself.

The Haitian pastor who invited Bill and two other men, took them to villages where he planted churches. At least one of the villages was so isolated that Bill and the other men were the first foreigners the villagers had ever seen. What Bill saw were a people who need to know that Jesus died to save them.

Bill left Haiti determined to go back. The following summer, Bill brought a team from his church. The teams kept coming. In 1981 Mission To Haiti was born. Today, this work continues to shine the light of the Gospel in places and in hearts darkened by voodoo. Praise the Lord, the Gospel is winning.
