For the past several years Haiti has experienced gang violence and instability unlike anything we have seen since Mission To Haiti began. The gangs have concentrated their wrongdoing in major cities and highways. This has had an impact on the cost of fuel, food and other daily necessities. Thankfully the communities and villages where we serve have remained relatively calm and quiet.

At the heart of this ministry in Haiti is the Mission Campus. The campus has remained safe and secure for several reasons. It is located near the international airport. And our local authorities have concentrated on keeping the area safe. As a result new families and businesses are relocating to our neighborhood.

We believe that God put us here and keeps us safe. For that reason, the U.S. teams and staff are able to travel and work from the campus. When the teams are not in Haiti, the campus is active and busy. The sponsorship office is open for the sponsored children

and the clinic is open for those who need to be seen. More than ever, having the mission campus open and operating is vital. We can fulfill the vision of equipping Haitians to change Haiti for Christ. When you give to the Founders' Challenge your support helps everyone we serve.

As the mission campus becomes more active, Mission To Haiti has taken steps to make it more secure. Last fall, three guards were hired to serve at the mission campus. The guards are trained and ready at all times. They work in 12-hour shifts, seven days a week. Everyone feels more comfortable having them on the mission campus.

Wilson, pictured to the right, is the daytime guard. He has more than ten years experience in security. He worked for several security firms and also at an embassy in Port au Prince. Wilson and the other guards take their responsibilities very seriously. They are Christian men with families. Now they are a part of the Mission To Haiti family.

Electricity is so important to being productive in Haiti. Two of our faithful sponsors, John and Lynette,

helped to outfit several of our facilities with solar power. For those facilities that need the generator we have to buy diesel to operate. This year, a gallon of diesel cost as much as \$9 US.

We are willing to pay that because it means more children will hear the Gospel. We want as many children as possible to be saved.
